HUDSON RECREATION SURVEY HIGHLIGHTS

An on-line survey was widely disseminated to Hudson residents. The survey was open from April 2, 2018 to May 18, 2018. Hard copies were also available in English, Spanish and Portuguese. There were 407 respondents.

WHO TOOK THE SURVEY

The majority of respondents were:

- Female (75%)
- Hudson residents (95%)
- Between the ages of 35 and 49 (68%)
- With children under 10 years old (55%) and with children between 10 and 18 (51%)
- Married (83%)
- Live near Forest Ave. (29%) and Farley Elementary School (26%)

PERCEPTIONS AND COMMUNICATION

- A large majority (58%) of respondents reported an overall **positive perception** of Hudson Recreation when asked this question directly. Additionally, a large number of respondents when asked for additional comments expressed positive feelings towards Hudson Recreation by their comment *"Great Job. Thank you."* A number also expressed their **appreciation for the survey**.
- A very large majority (80%) said they find Hudson Recreation programs and events to be **affordable**.
- Many survey respondents use **social media**. Most (88%) use **Facebook** regularly and a majority (56%) report that they follow Hudson Recreation on Facebook, however, a significant number (44%) say they do not.
- The majority of respondents (41%) stated that the **most pressing issue facing Hudson Recreation** is **Funding**. This was followed by Maintenance (27%) and Lack of Programs (25%).

KEY SURVEY HIGHLIGHTS

The following are ideas compiled from responses from all the survey questions. For the most part they represent majority opinions, although some are ideas suggested by only a few, but seemed to be in the same spirit as the opinions of others.

Respondents offered various ideas regarding ways to improve existing facilities and programming as well as suggestions for additional new ones.

NEW FACILITIES

Most popular suggestions regarding new facilities and programs included:

- Dog Park
- Community/Recreation Center
- "Central Playground" (like that in Littleton, Sudbury, Northborough)
- Expand **non-athletic programming** (to include art, STEM, cooking, etc.)
- Turf field (especially at Morgan Bowl)

Also:

- Pool (indoor/outdoor)
- Outdoor basketball
- More walking/hiking trails

Some respondents stated that they preferred taking better care of the existing facilities and improving these to extending to new ones.

The **number one** new facility respondents said they would like to see by far was a **DOG PARK**

IMPROVEMENTS TO EXISTING FACILITIES

Facilities most cited as needing improvement (this may to some extent be influenced by the age(s) of the respondents' children and/or where they live in relation to the various parks and playgrounds and therefore, which ones they visit/use): The three park/playgrounds/fields

- Wood Park
- Moulton's Field
- Cherry St.
- Forest Ave.
- Centennial Beach

Improvements called for include:

- Addition of Amenities
 - \circ Bathrooms
 - o Shaded seating areas, tables, picnic areas, bleachers
 - o Trash/recycling bins
 - o Fencing around play areas, especially the Splash Pad
 - More parking
- ADA accessibility
- Upgraded equipment, regular monitoring for safety
- Opportunities for wide range of ages to enjoy
- Attention to cleanliness and safety
- Improve access
 - Review rules regarding use (including for non-residents)
 - o ADA accessibility

SUGGESTIONS FOR OPERATIONAL IMPROVEMENTS

Respondents had a number of suggestions regarding ways to improve the management and operation of the Hudson Recreation Division. These included:

Better access to information

- More timely dissemination of information regarding programs (esp. with regard to summer programming)
- Update website
- Create on-line calendar
- Informational signage at facility locations

Some respondents reported being unaware of some of the Town's existing resources and offerings.

The three park/playgrounds/fields respondents felt were **most neglected** and in the greatest need for maintenance and upgrading are **WOOD PARK**, **MOULTON'S and CHERRY STREET**.

Expand seasons/times

• Working parents expressed a desire for programs to be more aligned with their needs, e.g. during half school days, afterschool, summer, etc. (some said they end up going to other Towns for additional programming, better hours)

Improve Maintenance

- Cleanliness, trash pick up
- Trimming grass, picking up brush and branches

Increase capacity

- Hire more staff
- Recruit more volunteers
- Create more opportunities for teens to volunteer
- Partner with relevant others (including schools, non-profit, private organizations)

- STEM
- Beading, sewing
- Art, painting, pottery
- Movie editing
- Wood working instruction
- Food related (Fairs, food contests, cooking lessons for all ages)

Sports/fitness-oriented

- Cross-country skiing
- Sailing lessons
- Ice-skating
- Adult fitness classes (Yoga, Pilates)
- Rock climbing
- Hip-hop / Dance
- Tae Kwon Do/Karate
- Summer programs (7)
 - Kids curling program
 - More swimming lessons (different ability levels)
- Nature education and hiking

Events

- Block dances (summer)
- Day trips
- Outdoor concerts
- Family movies (including summer outdoor movies)

POPULATIONS NEEDING ADDITIONAL PROGRAMMING

(according to survey respondents):

- Pre-school
 - Use of school playgrounds- allowed?
 - o Baby swings made available in all playgrounds
 - Update/upgrade for safety (e.g. flooring under playgrounds, fence-in play areas)

- Those needing handicap access (ADA access/universal design)
- Adult fitness
- Grandparents
